The beautiful sound coming from the orchestra in the Alice Busch Opera Theater for *Glimmerglass on the Grass* this season was remarkable, but I wanted to *see* at least some of its members. I was able to do that on August 11 at the annual Pierstown Grange Florence High Chamber Music Concert, held this year at the Meadow Links Golf Course due to renovations at the Grange.

For this concert, orchestra members were invited to play whatever music they *wanted* to play. Their selections were eclectic, covering a wide swath of music history and genres, and featuring unusual instrumental ensembles (e.g., a violin and tuba duet). Ubaldo Valli, a knowledgeable and witty MC, predicted we would like some pieces more than others. I have searched my music streaming sources to listen to some of the pieces again and to relive the memory of the concert.

The Glimmerglass Festival Orchestra is versatile and skillfully performs a wide variety of music every season. While I always look forward to the Pierstown Grange concert, I found it especially gratifying this year. On that evening, the musicians could hear my applause and see me stand in appreciation.

CELEBRATING PAUL KELLOGG

As world-class soprano Christine Goerke filled the terrace of the Alice Busch Opera Theatre with *Climb Every Mountain*, over 180 colleagues, and friends gathered to honor Paul Kellogg on Saturday, August 7. That song was perfect for him, and also for Christine! Her journey from a young artist at Glimmerglass to world class opera was a product of the artistic magnitude that Mr. Kellogg achieved during his 85 amazing years. Christine also sang two favorite French opera pieces by Richard Strauss and Gluck, with Christopher Devlin, Glimmerglass Head of Music, at the piano.

Accolades and memories were shared by a number of people who worked closely with Mr. Kellogg over the years. Artistic and General Director Francesca Zambello opened continued next column with thankful praise for Paul's Glimmerglass contributions including the oversight of our 914-seat theatre. Other keynote speakers included Jane Forbes Clark, President of the Clark Foundation and Chairman of the Baseball Hall of Fame; Robert Schlather, Glimmerglass Board of Trustees; Abby Rodd, Glimmerglass Director of Production; and Martin Kagan, former Executive Director of OPERA America who is now Director of Development at Ridgefield Playhouse in Ridgefield, Conn.

Educated in French and English literature, Mr. Kellogg had no real musical training and little managerial experience. Envisioning what a summer festival could become, he took on increasing executive and artistic leadership over the years. Under his leadership Glimmerglass became a leading summer opera festival with a strong Young Artists Program. Between Glimmerglass and City Opera, he had a consistent record of fostering new works. The two companies became creative partners, both demonstrating a commitment to innovative contemporary productions and overlooked 20th century works. Both welcomed emergent singers, with fresh voices and youthful stage appeal. This summer, our innovative *Glimmerglass on the Grass* festival season has been a great tribute to Paul Kellogg's amazing contributions to Opera.

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TREASURER'S REPORT FISCAL YEAR 2021¹

The Guild began fiscal year 2021 (October 1, 2020–September 30, 2021) with a cash balance of \$11,451.55, which had been raised during the previous year. In fiscal year 2021, an atypical season for the company with performances held outdoors and no opening night dinners, meet-and-greets, etc., the number of Guild activities was reduced and therefore expenses were low. Total expenses were \$8,265.36—largely attributable to our newsletter and our one major fundraising event, the Gala. Prior to the pandemic, expenses ran around \$20,000 per year.

The Guild received more than \$11,000 in gifts this year to support our general operations as well as \$4,590 for the Tribute Fund and \$7,500 in membership dues. These numbers do not reflect the many in-kind gifts and unreimbursed expenses contributed by Guild members. The Gala netted \$17,789.19, driven by a successful auction and sold-out dinner. Revenue in total was \$47,437.37.

Therefore, our net gain this year was \$39,172.01. At its August meeting, the Guild Board voted to contribute \$30,000 to Glimmerglass Festival, leaving \$20,624.01 on hand at the time of this report.

In addition, in 2021 the Guild registered with the IRS to be recognized as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. This status, once granted, will enable donations to the Guild to be receipted as tax-deductible donations.
